It's with a heavy heart that I announce the passing of one of our long-term Rotarians, Ron Iudice. Ron always had a smile for everyone, and he considered all of us his family. He referred to me as his sister. Ron was involved with many Rotary projects including auctioning "Pork in the Morning." He had perfect attendance for many years. Well, that is until he met Cindy online, and she turned his world around. Because both sets of their parents lived in San Jose one block from each other, Cindy and Ron spent a lot of their time together visiting and taking care of family members. Ron's Mom lived to be over 100 years old.

One of his largest projects for the community was the radio station KRYZ. Ron put thousands of hours into establishing and maintaining the station. People from all over the world listened in, and Ron could tell the exact number and from which country they listened. He assisted in developing a program that helped non-English speakers learn English. Community members would write stories that were read on air and the library had written copies of the stories so non-English speakers could read the words and learn how locals pronounced them.

With Cindy's help, Ron kept up a valiant fight against cancer of the esophagus and passed away on Monday, December 26.

Ron touched each of our lives in a very personal way. He really did love us all. That was Ron's special gift.
